How to get involved.


This may be a question you have now that you realize that God uses anyone for His work. Here's my recommendation to you:

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TEEN LESSON 2

the failure of the Church at Jerusalem

Acts 2:37-47:

The Church at Jerusalem must have been an exciting place to be! Can you imagine being a part of a service when 3,000 walk the aisle to accept Christ as their Savior? What about seeing a crippled man rise and walk? There was an unmistakable, genuine movement of God.

What is surprising is in spite of such love and devotion that these saints showed for our Lord, they still had a seemingly glaring omission which limited their efforts to *only* reaching the *Jewish* people.

Jesus set a target- the "house of Israel" (Mt. 10:6; 15:24)

His desired goal-

"...Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature" (Mk 16:15)

"...**both** in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth" (Acts 1:8) Both means simultaneously.

Where is your Jerusalem? Where could your Judaea be? Who are your Samaritans? The church at Jerusalem had a problem, their Jewish culture only allowed them to focus on Jerusalem and Judaea while Samaria and the uttermost were forgotten!

Possible reasons for this:

- Jesus, when going to the Samaritan woman at the well, was asked about His boldness in breaking the ethnic barrier to speak with her (Jn. 4:9-10).
- In Mt. 15:21-28, when dealing with a woman from Canaan whose daughter was demon possessed, Jesus made reference to the social view of the day. This being the opinion of the Jews that the Gentiles were as dogs (a deep cultural insult).

They would surrender to anything in reaching their *own* people group, but they would not go any further (Acts 2:9-11, 14, 22, 36, 39; 3:12; 4:10; 6:7; 11:19).

Is there a group of people in your community that you would consider "Samaritans"? How are you trying to reach them with the Gospel? Is there something in your heart that would prevent you from reaching them?

It has been said for *this* reason that God brought about the strong persecution and scattered them in Acts 8:1. They would not fully obey and take the Gospel to everyone for whom Jesus died. He then caused them to do it. When Philip (Acts 8)

and Peter (Acts 10), being directly sent by God, stepped outside of that realm and went to Gentiles also, the church legalists got upset with them (Acts 11:2-3). Acts 8:25 tells us how Peter, John, and Philip "preached the word" and "preached the gospel" in many villages of the Samaritans on their way back to Jerusalem. The preaching of the Gospel is necessary for salvation (Gospel tracts), but the preaching of the Word of God is necessary to show that saved person how to live. Literally, as the saved Jews were scattered to various lands, they took with them the Word of God available at that time. As a result, "the word of God grew and multiplied" (Acts 12:24).

Are you available?

If God wanted you to leave your friends and family to live in a place outside your comfort zone, would you be willing to go? Would you freely surrender or would it take persecution for you to go?

AVAILABILITY, THE GREATEST ABILITY

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"You were probably the last one of our children I expected to be in the ministry." This was a statement my mom made to me one evening when we were catching up during a recent visit when my family came to see us.
